Relinquishing our own selfish desires for the betterment of the group helps us mature in our faith.

Travel allows students the opportunity to apply what they have learned in the classroom, concert stage, and theatre. Our students have the privilege of working with professionals who possess a high level of expertise and artistry in their discipline. We gain insight into the dedication and work ethic of those that have achieved high levels of excellence in their craft.

Creating memories by having fun together is part of the joy of travel. We spend time with classmates we may not know very well. New friendships are established, and old friendships are strengthened. Having fun together allows us to leave our challenges and concerns behind. Proverbs 22:17 tells us that a cheerful heart is good medicine.

In the Fine Arts department, travel is one of our four components on which our department is built. Curriculum, cocurricular activities, service and travel are essential to helping students discover and develop their skills and gifts in the arts.
