Our band and performing arts students frequently participate in competitions, festivals, honor bands, honor choruses, and master classes. Recently, we had six band students who traveled to Valdosta State University to participate in the Georgia Association of Jazz Educators State Jazz Clinic. Five of our middle and high school performing arts students participated in the Georgia Music Educators District Honor Chorus at Brenau University from November 17-18. The cast and crew of Still Life with Iris competed in the Georgia High School Association One Act Play competition at Riverside Military Academy at the end of October and placed third in the region. On November 15th Dr. Noel Tredinnick, music director at All Souls Church in London, England, held a master class for our high school

performing arts students. Some of our band students participated in the Young Harris College Tri-State Middle School Honor Band, and other band students are preparing for district and state auditions. Our high school performing arts students are preparing for



GHSA Literary Meet, and Thespian Society competitions in February, and the band will perform in ACSI and GMEA performance evaluations in the early spring. The cast and crew of Seussical will be evaluated by a panel of judges for the Shuler Awards, which are the high school musical

When our students have goals, their individual practices and classroom rehearsals are more focused, and students are motivated to work towards excel-

Adjudicators and clinicians will often reiterate what we have been teaching, but perhaps teach the skill or explain the principle more clearly so students can grasp the concept. Our students form relationships with students from other schools and become a part of the larger fine arts community. As a Christian school, our students represent Christ constantly—including our co-curricular activities. Our students discover the joy of creating music and art together. The thrill of creating beauty in an ephemeral and excellent manner is an experience that students will remember the rest of their lives.
